Each agent talked about their jobs and explained to the students real world situations. (Cost of purchasing a house, buying a vehicle, loans, the cost of insurances, etc.). The students completed a "Real World Experience". They selected a career choice and had a monthly budget based on their salaries. They then could see if they had enough money to make the choices they selected.

Book Study Series: The Explosive Child



Brandy Buske, program coordinator serving Hillsboro, is leading our first MSSE book study on *The Explosive Child* by Ross W. Greene, PhD during the month of April and May. Participants will complete three activities from a choice board and discuss specific aspects of the book via zoom. *The Explosive Child* provides a new approach for understanding and parenting easily

frustrated, chronically inflexible children. The focus is on understanding factors that contribute to challenging behavior, reducing or eliminating these challenges, solving problems proactively, and reducing hostility between the adult and the child. According to Dr. Greene, the key to successfully helping explosive children is developing the child's ability to be more flexible, solve problems, and handle frustration. Children do the best they can with the skills they currently have. It is the adult's role to teach the missing skills allowing the child to have a brighter future.
