### Resources

The Arc of Illinois is the state's largest advocacy organization for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. They work on public policy and advocacy and provide education and training through various programs. They have many free trainings for parents through the Illinois Life Span Program and the Family to Family Health Information Center, which are typically scheduled during the lunch hour. Trainings are recorded and archived on the website as well. Topics have included applying for social security and health benefits for my child, IL Secretary of State Services for people with disabilities, Person Centered Planning, Guardianship and so many more!

**Services in Illinois** are managed through the <u>Illinois PUNS</u> (Prioritization of Urgency of Needs for Services) database. There are children's waivers and adult waivers that fund various home and community-based services (e.g., home based services, CILA group home independent living/supported independent living.) To get on the PUNS list, you need to contact your local Independent Service Coordination (ISC) agency, which in Central Illinois is <u>Central Illinois Service Access, Inc.</u> (CISA). ### **Guardianship:**

There are several types of guardianship that move from least restrictive to most restrictive. ### **Financial planning:**

The <u>Sibling Leadership Network</u> provides networking, connection, resources, and support to and for siblings of individuals with developmental disabilities. The <u>Sibling Support Project</u> provides similar connections.

## Parent Support via social media:

- 1) "Loving Neurodiversity" FB group was started by a mom of an autistic daughter here in Springfield, in-response to the many requests we received at Autism Support of Central Illinois for support groups. Michelle is now on the board of ASCI. It remains at least a virtual platform for parents to communicate about topics related to neurodiversity and parenting.
- 2) "Autism Support of Central Illinois" is on Facebook and offers recreational community programs for families with autism free of charge (typically younger ages, but all ages join us for horse riding.) Like the FB page to receive notifications of upcoming events.
- 3) "TASC" is a similar not for profit autism group around the Hillsboro area I think. They have a Facebook group.
- 4) "IPADDUnite" group on Facebook is very active. A lot of times the posts have to do with benefits (SSI & Medicaid) and adult services.
- 5) The "**Southwestern Illinois Autism Resources and Support**" Facebook group is great for getting tip sheets, visuals, and resources.
- 6) "Matt Cohen and Associates Advocacy Colloquium" is a Facebook group that deals with special education topics. Matt Cohen is a special ed attorney in the northern part of the state.
- 7) "Breaking Autism" is a special education law firm in the Chicago area and regularly posts information pertinent to special education rights and federal law on their Facebook page.
- 8) "TAAG" or "The Adult Autism Group" is another group in Springfield that hosts recreational events for young adults/adults with autism to get together and socialize website and on Facebook.
