MTSS Success: Teacher Perspectives

Katelyn Hoerchler, 3rd grade teacher at Litchfield CUSD #12: This year, my building has started a data team. The committee works together to try and guide struggling students in the best way possible. This committee has been able to help about 15 of our students who struggle most, academically and behaviorally, in the 2nd and 3rd grades. As a classroom teacher, I have learned so much about the importance of data, various interventions, RTI, and small group instruction. The data team ensures that we are implementing every possible strategy to help our students and we are seeing great success! This year, I have had three of my students in my classroom alone graduate from RTI, which is a huge accomplishment! The data team provided more meaningful interventions for struggling students and has increased classroom teacher knowledge about data and interventions.

Stephanie Luttrell, 3rd grade teacher at Litchfield CUSD #12: I was apprehensive about implementing data teams this year, as was my grade level team. However, throughout completing the steps required by the data team, I felt confident with the process. In my direct

experience with the data team, I brought a student forward as someone I had worked with in the classroom using various interventions and one on one help. I felt that my student was still struggling in both reading and math and felt that further intervention was needed. The data team made recommendations and different interventions were put in place. As a teacher, I feel very confident that after this process is done, I have exhausted every last strategy and intervention that is available to help my student to be successful before referring the student for a special education evaluation. I like knowing that I have data to prove that I have put in all the extra work to help my student and that if special education testing is decided by the team, it is because that is what is best for that student. Although I started with an attitude that was less than positive, I feel really good about my first experience using the data team to support my student in the most effective ways.
