Employee Spotlight: Making a Difference

Specialists serving MSSE member districts, were honored with the You Make the Difference award during the Mid-State Special Education Executive Committee Board meeting on October 21, 2020. The transition specialists implement a variety of transition services utilizing funding through the Department of Human Services (DHS) Secondary Transition Experience Program (STEP) as well as provide the important supports and expertise as students plan and transition during the high school years. In addition to partnering with businesses to obtain work experiences, exploring possible future careers and collaborating with teachers, guidance counselors, and families about post high school options, the transition specialists took advantage of an additional program through DHS. During the spring, summer and fall, MSSE transition specialists made over 1000 direct contacts with students via phone calls, Zoom or Google Meet, and in-person to ensure the well-being of students thru a connection with a caring adult. The MSSE Governing Board, Executive Committee, and administration, recognize their dedication and commitment to the education and well-being of all students as well as for their expertise in the area of transition services, innovation, compassion, and heartfelt enthusiasm for the students, staff, families, and communities served.
